Our overarching goal is to promote the holistic development of needy communities, enabling them to lead dignified and self-sufficient lives.



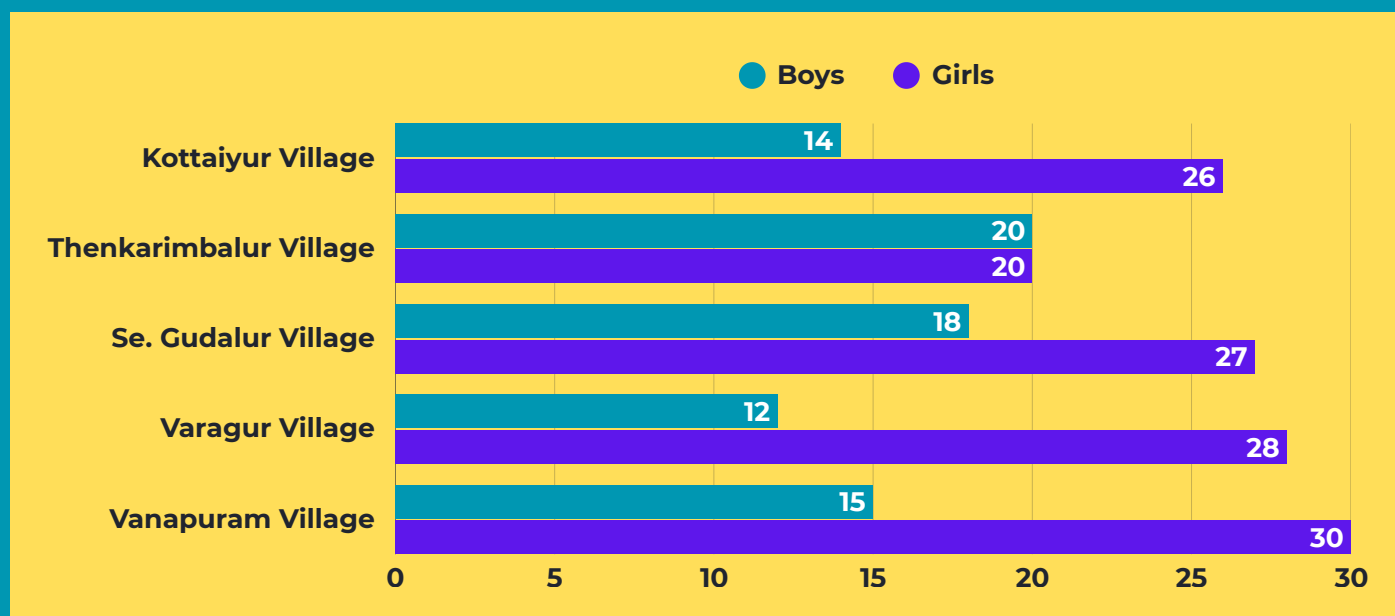
General Objectives

1. To enhance the quality of education and life for underprivileged children in rural and tribal communities.
2. To empower women by improving their quality of life and creating sustainable livelihood opportunities.
3. To foster eco-friendly communities and promote environmental security.
4. To improve the socio-economic and health conditions of people living with disabilities.
5. To enhance the health and well-being of vulnerable groups, including children, women, adolescent girls, the elderly, and HIV/AIDS-affected families.

Children Garden Programme

This year, our evening supplementary education centres in five villages - Vanapuram, Varagur, Se. Gudalur, Thenkarimbalur, and Kottaiyur - served 210 children, with a balanced focus on academic and co-curricular development.

Qualified teachers provided coaching in subjects like Tamil and English grammar, handwriting, and activity-based learning, while sports materials such as carom boards, volleyballs, and chess sets enriched their physical development.



The 15th-anniversary celebration of this programme, held at Vanapuram, saw 250 participants, including children, parents, and dignitaries like Dr. E.V.V. Kamban, Dr.T.Thasian, Social Scientist, Vellore, Mr.Madeswaran, Former Panchayat Union Chairman, Vanapuram and Mr.L. Gunasekaran, Former Municipal Counsellor, Tiruvannamalai and Mr. Rama Perumal.

The event highlighted the programme's success in bridging educational gaps and fostering confidence among children, many of whom have shown remarkable academic improvement and leadership skills. This programme was supported by Dr.Evelien de Hoop, Netherlands.

Observation of World Day Against Child Labour

On June 12, 2025, we observed World Day Against Child Labour across 10 villages in the Thandrapattu block. Our efforts included impactful village-level rallies, a widespread sticker campaign, and various other awareness programs. The participation was truly encouraging, with over 200 children, 80 youths, and 300 parents and other stakeholders actively involved in these initiatives. This collective engagement underscored the community's commitment to eradicating child labour and fostering a supportive environment for children's growth and education.



The primary focus of this campaign was to ensure every child's right to education. We specifically emphasized enrolling children into schools and colleges, preventing academic drop-outs, and promoting higher education for all children, with a significant emphasis on empowering girls through education. By addressing these critical areas, we aimed to not only raise awareness about the perils of child labour but also to provide tangible pathways for children to access quality education and secure a brighter future.

Nutrition Support for HIV/AIDS-Affected Women and Children

Recognizing the severe protein-energy malnutrition among HIV/AIDS-affected women and children, we provided nutritional kits to 100 beneficiaries, including transgender individuals and migrants. Each kit contained essentials like rice, wheat flour, nutrient mix powder, and hygiene products.

The programme, supported by Ms. Barbara Coaro, Studio progetto Soc. Cooperativa Socials of Italy, not only improved the health metrics of recipients but also restored their dignity. Many women reported increased energy levels, enabling them to pursue small-scale income-generating activities.



Potable Drinking Water for Tribal Families



In Jawadhu Hills, where tribal families faced severe water scarcity, we identified two villages - Kuttakollai and Chinnapaiyan Kollakottai - for sustainable water solutions. Through bore well projects supported by SELAVIP Foundation, Chile, 57 families now have access to clean drinking water.

This intervention has significantly reduced the time women and children spent fetching water, allowing children to attend school regularly and women to engage in productive work.

HIV/AIDS Target Intervention Programme

The programme, funded by TANSACS, has reduced stigma and new infection rates, with many participants now advocating for preventive measures in their communities.

Covering 63 hotspots across seven blocks in Tiruvannamalai District, our team of 18 members, including peer educators, conducted testing, awareness campaigns, and counselling for 1,496 high-risk individuals.

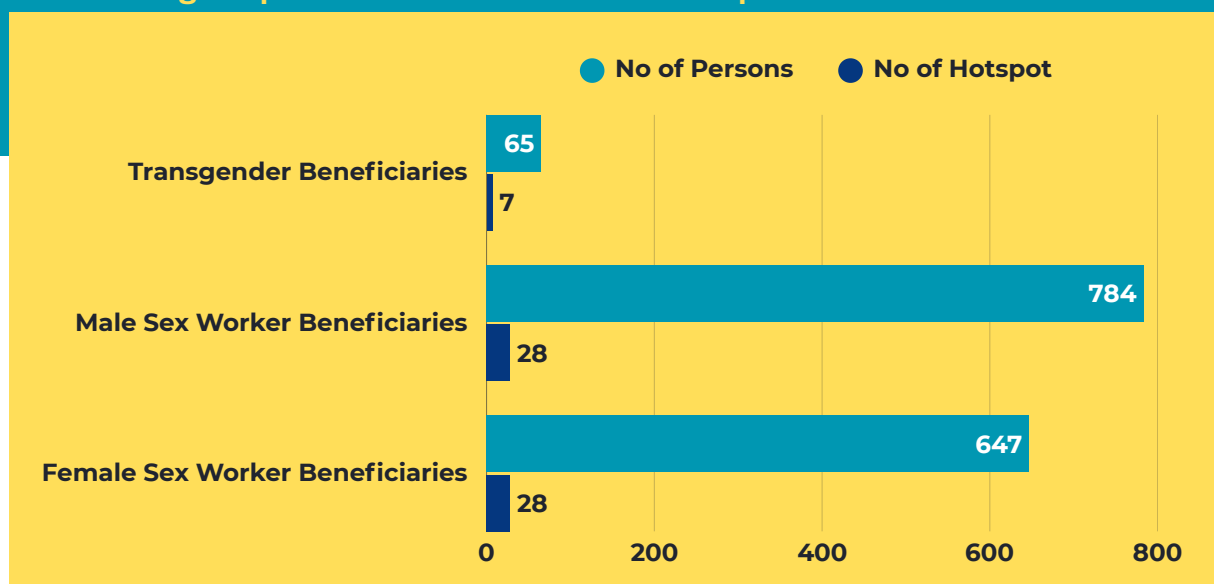

Family Counselling Centre

For 17 years, our center has provided critical support to women facing domestic violence, property disputes, and other injustices. Two trained counsellors offered guidance and legal assistance, helping numerous women rebuild their lives. One notable case involved a woman who, after counselling, started a small business and now supports her family independently.



Kasturibai Gandhi Bala Vidyalaya Residential School



This school in Mudiur, Kallakurichi District provides shelter and education to 50 vulnerable girls, including orphans and abuse survivors. Under SINAM's management, the girls have shown remarkable progress in academics and extracurricular activities, with several expressing aspirations to become teachers and healthcare workers.

Women Development

Forming 10 women's groups (200 members) in Thandrapattu Block, we conducted training on workers rights and minimum wage laws. These groups have since become self-reliant, with members collectively starting small businesses like tailoring units and herbal gardens.



Skill Training for Young Women

Six-month tailoring and embroidery courses empowered 40 young women, with six securing jobs in tailoring shops and five becoming self-employed. One participant pursued higher education, breaking the cycle of poverty in her family.



Consultation with PRI Elected Members



A August 2024 consultation with 77 Panchayat leaders addressed child labour and HIV/AIDS prevention. The event fostered collaboration between local governance and NGOs, leading to actionable strategies for community protection.

International Women's Day

Celebrated across five villages, the event united 232 women to discuss gender equality. Participants formed self-help groups and initiated small-scale enterprises, fostering economic independence.



Red Hand Day Campaign

On February 12th, Red Hand Day, we launched a dedicated campaign to raise crucial awareness about the grave issue of children's involvement in armed conflict across many countries. In the Indian context, this often manifests as their exposure to and participation in communal riots and violence fueled by caste-based discrimination. Our "Red Hand Day Campaign," a powerful anti-violence initiative, directly addressed these concerning realities.



This campaign effectively reached 260 children, making significant strides in curbing the prevalence of "violence culture" that had unfortunately begun to emerge in some schools. Children who participated in our programmes have demonstrated a newfound ability to resolve conflicts peacefully, showcasing a shift towards non-violent approaches and a greater understanding of the devastating consequences of aggression.

Combating Global Warming



On June 5, 2024, we celebrated World Environment Day with a series of impactful activities across 10 villages, focusing on crucial environmental issues. Our initiatives were a direct response to the alarming threat of global warming, which jeopardizes all living species – animals, plants, and people alike. We recognize that human survival is intrinsically linked to the health of our ecosystems, yet natural resources are being depleted at an unsustainable rate, leaving little for future generations. This selfish exploitation of vital resources like air, water, land, and forests spurred us to action.

Our community action programs in all 10 villages were comprehensive, aiming to foster a deeper connection with nature and promote sustainable practices.

Key activities included awareness creation on protecting endangered native trees and direct conservation efforts for these vital species. We also vigorously promoted biodiversity, emphasizing the importance of preserving every living species without disruption. To engage the younger generation, we formed five eco-clubs in five villages among school children, integrating environmental protection into our evening supplementary education centers.

Furthermore, we motivated women to develop kitchen gardens and herbal gardens at home, encouraging self-sufficiency and a closer relationship with nature. Finally, we advocated for minimizing the use of conventional fuel and electricity, encouraging the adoption of alternative energy sources to reduce our carbon footprint and build greener communities.



Recent Memberships and Awards

SINAM’s expertise earned us memberships in district-level government bodies, including the Child Protection Committee and Vigilance Committee. Our accolades, such as the Best State-Level NGO for Child Labour Eradication (2022) and the Life Time Achiever Award (2023), reflect our unwavering commitment to social justice.

Financial Analysis of Expenses (FY 2024-25)

Institutional Engagement:

- 85% of funds came from institutional donors (TANSACS + Foreign Grants), ensuring program scalability.
- Foreign grants were diversified across 3 NGOs (Italy, Netherlands, Chile).
- Total Funds Mobilized: ₹49.5 Lakhs

Key Insights

1. Programme-Centric Spending:

- 59% of total expenses (₹29.2L) directly supported core missions (HIV/AIDS, counselling, education, nutrition).
- TANSACS HIV/AIDS Programme alone accounted for 48%, reflecting prioritization of health interventions.

2. Operational Efficiency:

- Administrative costs were kept low (0.6%), indicating lean operations.
- High reserves (₹16.7L, 34%) suggest prudent financial management for future projects.

3. Debt Management:

- Loan repayments (₹2.87L, 5.8%) indicate disciplined liability handling.

Though SINAM allocated less amount for direct educational expenses, its smart, resourceful approach maximized reach. By using volunteer teachers, donated community spaces the organization provided education and motivation to 500+ children at minimal cost. Beyond classrooms, awareness campaigns and nutrition support boosted children's health and attendance.

Staff and volunteers dedicated 60% of their time to child-focused activities—like parent workshops and counselling—while HIV/AIDS programs also addressed child protection.

Hence the results are... Improved literacy, life skills, and lower dropout rates, proving that impact isn't just about money, but commitment and creativity.

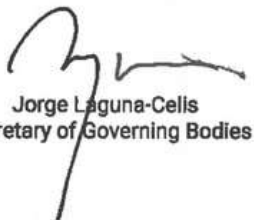
