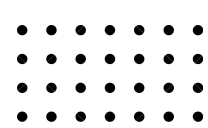
Children Garden Programme / Education



During this reporting year, we had 5 Education Motivation centres in Thandaampattu block of Tiruvannamalai district with the total of 200 children. Each centre has an educator cum motivator to provide education, counselling, motivation and help them in their inward and outward development. The children come and learn in an eco-friendly environment and child friendly approach was followed. The children were given educational materials including school bags, T-shirt, steel water bottle and all other required educational materials. With the children, their mother and the community members, we celebrated the following events / special programmes for creating awareness, enhancing community participation in educational development of children and for the behaviour modification

- National Girl Child Day
- Child Protection & Child Rights Day POCSO Awareness Day (2012 Act)
- Red Hand Day
- International Women's Day
- Environmental Day
- World Day Against Child Labour
- Anti Child Marriage
- Tree Plantation Awareness Programme.

In addition to this, the children were helped to participate in the essay competition, music competition, elocution competition, drawing competition and other school / interschool competitions. The marginalised children's confidence level, subject proficiency, reading skill, writing skill and recitation skill was remarkably increased. Those activities were supported by the Dr. Evelien De Hoop, Netherlands.



Government had given the responsibility of overall co-ordination and management of the following 2 residential school for promoting girl children's education in rural area and tribal area, based on the following 3 objectives

- Increasing the school enrolment of girl children
- Prevention of school drop outs
- Ensuring continuing education of socially excluded girl children.

This KGBV Residential School situated in Mudiyanur village of Kallakurichi District. 50 girl children are residing in the school and continuing their education from Class 6 to 8th standard. There are 100 Tribal girl children studying in this school on a residential basis. They are studying from 6th to 8th standard. These girl children are from tribal community in Jawadhu Hills.

SINAM NGO has been monitoring the quality of education and carried out the following activities during the reporting year.

- Correspondent to the school, responsible for the Teachers appointment, management of the school including quality control.
- Overseeing the supply of 3 times nutrition meals to all 150 girl children.
- Monitoring the services of Teachers, head master cum warden.
- Promoting the quality of education and the prevention of school drop outs.
- Ensured the school education upto 8th standard and beyond in other schools.
- Enhancing life skill, life coping skill and co-curricular / extracurricular activities.

The teachers received Government salary and other benefits. SINAM NGO provided the following to all girl children.

- School Bags – 150
- School Education Materials including Note books, stationary materials
- T-Shirts – 150
- Steel Water Bottles – 150

Those Education Materials were supported by the Dr. Evelien De Hoop, Netherlands.



HIV/AIDS Target Intervention Programme



This project is funded by Tamil Nadu State AIDS Control Society (TANSACS), Chennai. The project has a Project Manager, Project Director, Counsellor, Outreach workers and PEER Educators. This project has the following programme focus points

- Identification of Hot spots in 7 blocks and working with the MSWs / FSWs and High risk groups. Identified 64 Hot spots across 7 blocks and carried out the regular services.
- Reduction of social stigma and enhancing the social inclusion among the positive people.
- Early diagnosis and treatment of newly infected victims.
- Preventive measures of HIV/AIDS

During the reporting year 2025–2026, various services were provided to 1,639 beneficiaries, including:

- **Transgender – 67**
- **Men who have Sex with Men (MSM) – 840**
- **Female Sex Workers (FSWs) – 732**

Counselling and support services have been given to FSW, MSM and TG, high risk individuals. Awareness education was given to high risk people for the prevention of HIV/AIDS. Information, Education and communication materials were widely circulated to the project area for the information dissemination and for behaviour modification. Advocacy programmes were conducted with various service providers and community people. Four health camps were conducted. Around 80 members benefited out of every health camp. Blood test was also carried out.

Potable Drinking water for Vulnerable Families



Drinking water project was carried out to two tribal villages in Jawadhu Hills

a) Kuttakollai Village

b) ChinnapaiyanKollakottai Village

This project provided potable drinking water to 57 tribal families in Jawadhu Hills at their door step through the water pipe line. This project has been managed by the tribal water committee.

This committee was responsible for the planning, implementation, management and monitoring of the project. The project has the following components.

- **Identification and initial survey of the beneficiaries**
- **Use of traditional diviner and modern geological water diviner for fixing the underground-water potential area.**
- **Formation of management of water committee.**
- **Digging of a deep bore wells**
- **Installing the electric motor**
- **Plumbing work and water connectivity to the over head water tank and to the supply lines through 57 water taps**
- **Obtaining permission from government.**
- **Handing over to the local government for the future follow up and maintenance.**

Training was organised for the water users to prevent the water wastages and to use the scarced water during summer through water management. From each family, at least one adult female member participated in the training. This project was funded by SELAVIP Foundation, Chille.

Sanitary Toilets to girls KGBV Residential school in Mudiyanur.



Two sanitary toilets and a bathroom was constructed to Kasturba Gandhi Balika Vidyalaya Residential School at Mudiyanur village Kallakurchi District. 50 girls were studying in this middle school (Class 6 to 8). This residential school they water connected toilets and bathroom. SINAM NGO constructed two sanitary toilets and a bathroom, fully covered and protected. Each individual girl child was ensured for privacy and security. This project was funded by Ms. Barbara Coaro, Studio Progetto Cooperativa Sociale, Italy

Women Empowerment



Vulnerable women from Thandrapet Block working in the unorganised sector with low wages and without social security benefits were identified and supported through various capacity-building initiatives during the reporting year.

a) Unorganised Women Groups

Unorganised women groups are organised in 10 village clusters with 20 women each. They are within the age group of 30 to 40. These 200 registered women were given various capacity development programmes during the reporting year which were including the following

- Contributory Provident Fund (CPF) benefits and procedures
- ESI benefits
- Women Workers' Rights & Protection Measures
- Employees Provident Fund (EPF)
- Block-level union formation for unorganised women workers
- Free legal aid training
- Social security and personal security at work

b) Young Women's Development Group (YWDG)

Young women in the age group of 18 – 25 are organised in 10 villages. The maximum members of each group shall not exceed 20. When they exceed age 25, they automatically leave the group and the new members can be enrolled. So the total memberships need not exceed 20. All above 200 young women were given the following capacity development training.

- Overcoming fear and failure
- Adolescent sex / sexuality
- Adolescent nutrition
- Anaemia prevention and control
- Family formation and pregnancy care
- Benefits of small saving and micro in restaurant
- Family budgeting and family education.

c) Block level and District Level Advocacy programmes for the unorganised workers safe work Environment

This one day advocacy programme was held at Thandrapet block development meeting hall on 13.08.2025. The Block Development Officer (Regular) Block Development Officer (Scheme) Chengam Constituency Legislative Member, elected panchayat leaders, panchayat level officials, unorganised workers representatives, media groups were the participants. 45 participants participated. It was decided to maintain a register for the migrant workers for Thandrapet Block so that the Government officials can visit the work spot and monitor the work environment. If the work environment is not safe, the regulatory measures can be taken by the District Labour Welfare Officer.

Tree Plantation and Environmental Awareness Programme



Tree plantation and environmental awareness programmes were conducted in Tiruvannamalai District to address environmental challenges and promote sustainable practices. Though Tiruvannamalai is spiritually significant, the district faces several environmental concerns.

The major environmental issues addressed include:

a) Water Scarcity

- Declining groundwater levels due to reduced water recharge.
- Awareness was created on the role of trees in rainwater absorption and groundwater conservation.

b) Hill Degradation

- Addressed issues such as deforestation, stone quarrying, and forest fires affecting Arunachala Hill and Jawadhu Hills.
- Explained the importance of tree plantation in soil conservation and preventing land degradation.

c) High Temperature

- Created awareness on the role of trees in reducing local temperature and protecting communities from heat-related risks.

d) Air Pollution

- Highlighted the importance of trees in reducing dust and carbon emissions caused by traffic and industrial activities.
- Promoted native tree species such as Neem, Vembu, Pungan, and Jamun for environmental protection.

e) Loss of Biodiversity

- Created awareness on conserving native trees to support birds, bees, medicinal plants, and other biodiversity.

A one-day training programme on tree plantation and environmental awareness was conducted for volunteers of the Save Environment Group (SEG), children, and women leaders from workers' groups in Tiruvannamalai District. A total of 325 participants attended the programme. The programme was supported by India Donates, New Delhi.

Nutrition Supplementation



Protein Nutrition supplement was given to 85 HIV infected women including children in view of their protein deficiency. This has helped them to enhance their CD4 count. CD4 count is a blood test that measures the number of CD4 cells (a type of white blood cell) in our body. It is also called T-cells, which are vital for immune functions as they co-ordinate the body's defence against infections, viruses and diseases. HIV infected people get in to many opportunistic diseases due to their poor immune system.

This project was funded by Ms. Barbara Coaro, Studio Progetto Cooperativa Sociale, Italy.

Family Counselling and Support Services



The women living in poverty and in the family disharmony are the victims of suffering, isolation and loneliness. The women facing domestic violence, property disputes, and other injustice including sexual violence and social desertification require immediate relief, counselling, legal support and rehabilitative measures through linkages with other service providers within the Government and outside. In view of this, family counselling centre was incorporated into SINAM NGO for the last 18 years. During 2025-2026, 283 women were helped restart their lives through counselling and other integrated support measures. Legal support was also given through district free legal aid services. Few of them started income generation activities and restarted their life and career. This programme was supported Central Social Welfare Board, New Delhi.

De-addiction Awareness



De-addiction awareness programme was held at Mudiyanur Village Kallakurchi District on 26-06-2025. Totally 40 volunteers participated in the awareness programme. Awareness programme included the following activities.

- Inauguration and pledge on drug free village formation.
- Doctor's talk on how alcohol damages kidney, liver and hyper tension.
- Street play by SHG women on domestic violence due to alcohol.
- Staring of testimony from one recovered person from the village.
- Youth games and prize for best anti-drug slogan.
- Details of 1446 help line and distribution of I.E.C. leaflets.
- Linkages with ministry of social justice for free I.E.C. materials and for master trainers.
- Tamil Nadu State De-addiction centre, Tiruvannamalai Government Hospital OPD for alcohol / Tobacco counselling. The programme started at 10 am and ended at 4 pm.

Child Rights awareness meeting



Child Rights awareness meeting was held for Tiruvannamalai around 50 women leaders from workers group leaders and Youth group leaders participated in the awareness meeting. This awareness meeting helped the children, parents, teachers and communities what rights every child has, and how to protect those rights. The UN convention on the rights of the child UNCRC 1989, India accepted it and made Laws like right to education Act, 2009, POCSO Act 2012 etc. The focus major rights of children was explained and emphasised at the meeting.

- 1.Right to survival including birth
- 2.Right to protection – free from abuse neglect, child labour, trafficking, early marriage.
- 3.Right to development, free shooting till 8th standard, play, nest, library, cultural activities.
- 4.Right to participation. Child panchayat / parliament, student council, asking child opinion in decisions affecting them.

This child awareness meeting in Tiruvannamalai district is very much needed in the context of

- a) Child Labour
- b) Dropouts
- c) Child Marriage
- d) Mal-nutritious of children, especially nutrition insecurity.

International Women's day programme



SINAM NGO celebrated International year of women 2026 as “PengalinVarudam year of Women’s strength”. This was celebrated on 10-03-2026 at Vanapuram Village Thandrapet block. Around 100 women leaders participated. SINAM NGO has been working with marginalised and excluded Dalit and Tribal women for their development through women self-reliant through skills, SHGs, income generation schemes, sanitary toilets, housing and freedom from alcohol and violence.

The four pillars of women empowerment was explained.

1. **Equality** – Equality in Education employment and wage structure
2. **Safety** – Freedom from domestic violence, and alcohol, re-addiction programme for their counterpart men and legal awareness for women.
3. **Development** – skill training, income generation programme for women digital literacy and financial literacy
4. **Leadership** – women in panchayat administration, gram sabha meetings, SHG, federation and leadership training to bridge the political gap.

The women leaders are from various SHGs and women development groups in Thandrapet block.

Leprosy Awareness programme:



Theme: “Thozhu NoiIlla Oor” Leprosy free village 2026.

“Detect early, cure fully and treat with dignity” was a slogan followed. Leprosy work is 20% medical and 80% is social work. Medicine is freely available in government hospital. Social stigmatisation is a real problem.

The following government schemes were explained to the village volunteers.

- a) National Leprosy Eradication programme Government distribute free medicine, disability kits and MCR shoes.
- b) Sparsh Leprosy awareness campaign – Government gives I.E.C. materials, barriers in January – February of every year.
- c) Disability pension – Grade 2 deformity patients are eligible for Tamil Nadu pension of Rs.1500 / month.

Key Messages to spread

- 1) Leprosy is curable – MDT is free at all PHC / Government Hospitals.
- 2) It does not spread easily – it needs close, long contact. 95% people have natural immunity. After one dose of MDT, you can hug, eat with patient.
- 3) Early detection leads no deformity.

If you see while patch and no feeling, go to primary health centre immediately. Don’t go to quacks.

The above content was transmitted to the trainees during the one day training of village volunteers. Totally 30 volunteers participated in the training.

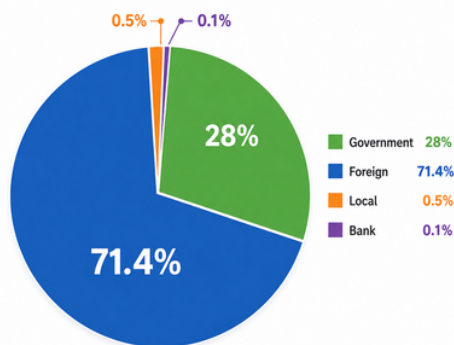

SINAM has received many awards in recognition of good services rendered to the marginalized / excluded people. A few of them are listed below:

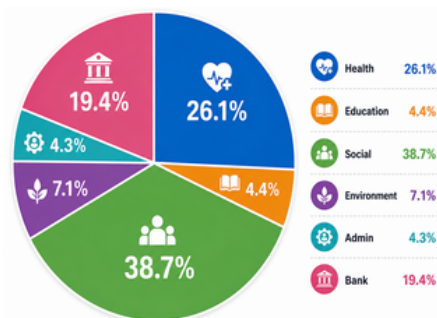
